PREFACE

This volume contains a Calendar of the Patent Rolls for the first two years of the reign of Elizabeth. It also includes the two Pardon Rolls for the first year (Supplementary Patent Rolls 67 and 68).

The rolls for these years show no marked difference of subject matter from those of the preceding reign.

In order to save space and accelerate progress, the following departures have been made from the practice hitherto followed of calendaring most of the entries very fully:—

- (1) In the case of patents relating to land, such as grants, leases and licences to alienate, the detailed descriptions of land are generally left out. These omissions are indicated by the use of phrases such as 'lands (named with tenants' names).' Entries, however, of special interest, such as those dealing with property in London, are still calendared in full.
- (2) Grants of the wardship and marriage of the queen's wards usually include the grant of an annuity for maintenance, to be assigned by the Court of Wards out of lands of the ward's inheritance in specified places. The names of these places are omitted in the Calendar; they are given in greater detail in the Inquisitions post Mortem, and are also often found to be inaccurate.
- (3) Special pardons often recite the very minute details given in the indictment relating to the offence pardoned. These particulars are left out, the omission being indicated by a phrase such as '(details given).' Similar long and detailed recitals sometimes occurring in other types of patent are treated in the same way.
- (4) In licences to alienate and similar entries, conveyances of land in fee simple are calendared as alienations 'by A. to B.' without mention of any limitation.
- (5) Conventional clauses or phrases have been either omitted or abbreviated throughout. And the preambles, which are often elaborate, have been compressed as far as possible; they have generally been removed to form a separate paragraph at the end of the entry to which they belong.

PREFACE

The general plan for calendaring the Patent Rolls of this reign was drawn up in 1930 by Mr. M. S. Giuseppi, F.S.A., until recently an Assistant Keeper of the Public Records, and was approved by my predecessor, Mr. A. E. Stamp.

The whole of this volume, Preface, Text and Index, has been prepared by Mr. J. H. Collingridge, M.A., an Assistant Keeper of the Public Records.

Power for the portreeve and burgesses by their common council to make ordinances for the government of the craftsmen of the borough and the victualling of the borough; so that they be not repugnant to the laws of the realm or the royal prerogative. To have 12 of the better men of the borough by the name of the principal burgesses to assist the portreeve and be the common council; also to have a steward of the borough. Appointment of John Dodinge to be the first and present portreeve, to be sworn to execute the office until Michaelmas next and thereafter until another be elected and sworn; and of William Carante, John Kerey, James Vewgers, William Donyll, Richard Gyles, David Laneman, John Crewes. Thomas Coffin, John Williams, Richard Craftesman, Denis Grave and Robert Quirke to be the principal burgesses, to be sworn before the portreeve. The portreeve to be clerk of the market there. The portreeve and steward, with others commissioned by the Crown, to be justices of the peace there. The portreeve and burgesses to meet there yearly on the feast of the Nativity of St. Mary between 9 and 12 a.m. and elect two of the principal burgesses in the presence of the other inhabitants, that the other inhabitants may then and there elect one of the two to be portreeve, who shall be sworn to hold office for one year from Michaelmas until Michaelmas following and thereafter until another be elected and sworn; if a portreeve elect on notice given shall refuse to serve, the portreeve and 12 chief burgesses may commit him to prison until he will serve or pay a suitable

fine. The portreeve elect to be sworn before his predecessor, or in his default before the steward and other burgesses; if a portreeve shall die or be removed, the burgesses shall within eight days elect two of the burgesses that the other inhabitants may elect one of them to be portreeve until Michaelmas then next and thereafter until another be elected and sworn. Whenever a burgess shall die, leave the borough or be removed, the portreeve and burgesses may within eight days elect in his place another of the inhabitants for life or otherwise as they shall think fit, who shall be sworn before the portreeve. The portreeve and burgesses to elect a man learned in the law to be steward for life or otherwise as they shall think fit, who shall be sworn before the portreeve. The portreeve to appoint a serieant at mace for his term of office or during his pleasure, who shall perform the same duties as the serjeants at mace in London, shall bear a mace inscribed with the royal arms within the bounds aforesaid and shall be sworn before the portreeve. The portreeve and burgesses to have a court of record there before the steward for all pleas arising there not exceeding 40l. in value; power for the portreeve and burgesses to issue summonses, attachments and distraints, to attach defendants in default of chattels, to hear and determine pleas, to execute process and judgments, and to levy fines to the use of the borough, as in London. The portreeve and burgesses to have a prison there; the portreeve and steward to be on every commission to deliver the same. The portreeve and burgesses to have a market there every Thursday and two fairs yearly, to wit, on 1 March and the eve of St. John the Baptist, each lasting from noon until noon on the morrow. No one without leave of the portreeve and burgesses to buy or sell victuals from ships coming to the road and port of the borough from abroad (except victuals for the private use of the households of those wishing to buy such victuals) within 20 days of the ships' arrival, on pain of forfeiture to the portreeve and burgesses of the wares bought or sold. The burgesses to be quit of tolls (named) throughout the realm for their wares. The grant to be void, if ever the portreeve and burgesses shall be in default in the repair and maintenance of the port.

At their suit, for their better government: Mynhed is an ancient town on the sea coast and there is a port there on the defence of which from time immemorial the inhabitants have spent every year 50l. and more, which expense they have borne through the import and export of wares; this trade has been so destroyed by the recent plague of wars with which the sea has been so long infested, that they can no longer bear this charge of defending the port; it is so going to ruin that not even the smallest skiff can call without danger; and so disaster is likely to come upon the counties of Somerset, Devon and Cornwall, so that both the merchants on those coasts and the said town will be ruined and also the Crown will be defrauded of the customs on the wares of the town which were a certain and abundant profit to the queen's ancestors.
